# **About Agnes Scott College**

Agnes Scott College is an independent undergraduate college in the United States. Agnes Scott's campus lies in downtown Decatur, Georgia, nestled inside the perimeter of the bustling metro-Atlanta area.

The college was founded in 1889 as Decatur Female Seminary by a group of Presbyterians under the leadership of their minister, Frank H. Gaines. In 1890, the name was changed to Agnes Scott Institute to honor the mother of the college's primary benefactor, Col. George Washington Scott. The name was changed again to Agnes Scott College in 1906, and remains today a liberal arts college for women.

Agnes Scott currently enrolls 900 students. The student to faculty ratio is 11:1 and 100% of the tenure-track faculty hold terminal degrees.

The college offers 34 undergraduate majors and 31 minors and is affiliated with numerous institutions, including Georgia Institute of Technology and Emory University School of Nursing. Students who graduate from Agnes Scott receive a Bachelor of Arts or a Bachelor of Science degree.

Agnes Scott is affiliated with the Presbyterian Church (USA). The current mission of the college, adopted in 2002, states: Agnes Scott College educates women to think deeply, live honorably and engage the intellectual and social challenges of their times.

### Qiao Chen Solomon Director, String Chamber Ensemble



Hailing from China, Dr. Qiao Chen Solomon began playing violin at the age of 8 and later pursued the studies of viola, voice, piano, and conducting. Qiao performs as soloist, conductor, chamber musician, and orchestra player throughout the United States, Asia, and Europe. She was a prizewinner in the National Music Talent Competition in Guangzhou, 5th Liaoning Violin Competition (China), the West Waterford Music and Drama Festival (Ireland), and the MTNA Competition (United States). She has been invited to perform and teach masterclasses at the South Carolina Chamber Music Festival, the Grumo Music Festival in Italy, the University

of North Carolina in Wilmington, the University of Southern Mississippi, and the University of Nevada in Las Vegas. She has performed at Carnegie Hall with the ARCO chamber orchestra, and with the same group she has performed and recorded Vivaldi's Violin Concertos on the Art Classics Label as a featured soloist. Qiao recorded Pulsar by Augusta Read Thomas and the Sonata for Viola and Piano by Rebecca Clark for a double CD collection of works by women composers commissioned by the National Council of Women of the United States. In March 2015 she gave the world premiere of the commissioned solo violin work Capricious Toccata by Augusta Read Thomas, during the composer's residency at Agnes Scott College. In 2012 she and pianist Hyunjung Rachel Chung established the Eureka Duo with the mission to study, perform, and promote works by women composers. Their most recent recital program features compositions by Amy Beach, Lili Boulanger, Rebecca Clark, and Jennifer Higdon.

Qiao is an Associate Professor of Music, Director of Orchestral and Strings Studies, and Chair of the Music Department at Agnes Scott College. Qiao holds a Doctoral Degree in Musical Arts from the University of Georgia, a Master's degree in Music Performance from the University of Limerick in Ireland, and Bachelor's degree in Music Performance and Music Education from Beijing Normal University in China.

# David D'Ambrosio Director, Woodwind Ensemble & Piano Duets



David D'Ambrosio, pianist, is Director of Piano Instruction/Accompanying at Agnes Scott College in Decatur, Georgia. As a member of the faculty for more than 25 years he has performed five piano concerti with the Agnes Scott College Community Orchestra and an arrangement of a Rachmaninoff Prelude with choral accompaniment with the Agnes Scott Collegiate Chorale, among many other recitals with vocalists and instrumentalists.

D'Ambrosio graduated from the Juilliard School with a Master of Music degree in

piano performance where he was a student of Ania Dorfmann. Highlights of his professional career include touring the United States and Canada with the Norman Luboff Choir as accompanist and solo pianist, performing on numerous concert series in the southeast, including several sponsored by the Pro-Mozart Society of Atlanta, and appearing in chamber ensemble performances with the Atlanta Virtuosi in their annual Hispanic Arts Festival Series. D'Ambrosio has performed as keyboardist with the Atlanta Civic Opera and its Opera Studio, and was a member of an opera ensemble that toured throughout Metro Atlanta schools under the auspices of Young Audiences of Atlanta. He has frequently served as an adjudicator for piano festivals and competitions.

For 27 years Mr. D'Ambrosio served as official staff accompanist of the Southeast Regional Metropolitan Opera Auditions. Most recently he was accompanist in recital for the 60th anniversary of the Atlanta Opera Guild and collaborated in a voice recital sponsored by the Macon Concert Association at Wesleyan College. Mr. D'Ambrosio served a two-year term, from 2010/12, as Vice President of Programs for Georgia Music Teachers Association.
